From the Executive Director...

Hello to all residents and associates!! I want to thank you all again for your continued efforts and patience during these challenging times. The challenges that we are facing continue and you all have been very responsive, and patient and I will continue to ask that you follow all the necessary guidelines that we have in place.

COVID-19 Update: Currently, Cumberland County's positivity rate is 9.7% (as of 3/31/23). We have lifted the masking guidelines in Residential Living areas. This would be for RL residents and their visitors. Although we are not requiring masks to be worn, we are highly recommending masking for those who are considered immune-compromised. We are still requiring masking for all associates and for The Oaks SNF and MapleWood AL visitors (this would include RL residents who are visiting The Oaks SNF and MapleWood AL). We will continue to follow the science and the direction of our federal and state regulators when it comes to the

pandemic. Please continue to ask questions and provide feedback as this is also a learning process for all of those involved. I also wanted to get back to some other operational updates as we need to forge ahead and continue the great work that we do here at Bethany Village.

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Our commitment to providing a safe living and work environment, for those who reside and work here, is as strong as ever. We remain diligent about preparation, process, and awareness regarding preventive measures for coronavirus and other communicable viruses and diseases. We continue to review the latest CDC guidance and will continue to align our policies and guidelines based on these updates. We have removed the active screening process for the entire community.

We have been consistent throughout the pandemic in examining all the guidance and science before easing any coronavirus restrictions. We must also consider information and guidance from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and state or local (Continued on page 2)

requirements.

We have and will continue to update our policies and procedures for our residents and updated travel and quarantine guidelines have been placed on the "BV Family and Friends" page. This can be linked through https://www.asbury.org/bethany-village/resources-events/family-friends/

Financial Update: Bethany did not meet the Operating Ratio (OR) for February. The OR came in at 105% compared to a budgeted OR of 95%. This is a negative variance of 10%. We were over in expenses by \$173,842. Primary drivers of this variance were due to being over in contract labor (C.N.A.) in The Oaks by \$270,000 and in leases (expense of the temporary boiler unit for the West Apartments) by \$90,000. We also were under in revenue for the month by \$93,837. This was due to not meeting occupancy levels in both MapleWood and The Oaks.

YTD: BV is currently at 98.9% compared to a budgeted OR of 96.2%. This is a negative variance of 2.7%. We are over in expenses by \$254,459 (Contract Labor) but are over in revenue by \$102,000 (Foundation and Federal Covid Expense reimbursement). The BV Senior Leadership Team will continue to ensure that we are doing everything that we can to ensure that we are maximizing our resources while providing quality care and services. The leadership team did submit an OR contingency plan for 2023 to ensure we do all that we can to meet our goals.

Staffing: We are still facing several staffing issues at BV. We continue to have shortages in housekeeping, dining, and clinical areas (SNF C.N.A.). Currently, we have several open full-time positions across the community. We are being creative to ensure that we are doing all that we can to attract and retain our staff and do appreciate your ongoing patience and support during these challenging times. We do understand the frustration that is occurring. We will continue to do all that we can to ensure that we are meeting these needs in this area.

Occupancy: (as of 3/31/2023): We are currently 94.4% occupied (compared to a budget of 94.8%). In Residential Living, we currently have 13 West Apartments and 1 Court Apartment available. We also have 2 Assisted Living rooms and 3 SNF beds available. We have extended the current incentive plan for the West Apartments and will be working with our corporate marketing team to develop other methods to fill these openings.

BV West Land Sale: The West Land Sale contract will be closed on 3/29/23. I will continue to work with the buyer and the corporate team to ensure that this is a seamless process. I received feedback from both residents and associates on the utilization of these funds as we are re-investing the proceeds back into the community. I will continue to work with the BV Community Advisory Council and the BV Long Term Planning committee on this process. More to come.

BV West Pipe Burst Update: We continue to renovate the BV West Common area (Springfield's, Café, and Clinic/Pharmacy area) due to the pipe burst that we had over the Christmas holiday. We will be re-opening this area on 4/3/2023. This includes the West Main Entrance, Billiards room, Reading room, Springfield's restaurant, Collegiate Café, Computer Lab, and Clinic. We do want to thank you for your patience and understanding over the last several months as this was a major project that did have an impact on those

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areas.

2023 Great Place to Work Survey and 2023 Resident Satisfaction Survey: Bethany Village will be completing the 2023 Great Place to Work (Associate) Survey starting March 20, 2023 and ending on April 4, 2023. BV will also be completing the 2023 Resident Satisfaction Survey in May of 2023.

2022/2023 AL and SNF Annual Surveys: BV was able to complete the 2022 Annual Assisted Living (AL) survey on October 5, 2022. This was our first annual survey that we had in AL for the last 3 years. We did receive some minor deficiencies and were cleared of those in November of 2022. We have received our updated AL license and are in good standing with the State.

The 2023 annual Oaks clinical and building survey took place in February/March and we received 3 minor deficiencies. We were able to be cleared of those areas and are in good standing with the state (DOH and Life Safety)

PARCR's April Quarterly Meeting will be at Londonderry Village in Palmyra on April 12, 2023, at 10:00am. The keynote speaker will be Garry Pezzano, the CEO of LeadingAge PA. He will discuss his plans for LeadingAge PA as well as the legislative climate in Harrisburg for issues affecting CCRCs. If you are not familiar with LeadingAge PA they are a trade association representing more than 380 quality senior housing, health care, and community services like Bethany Village across the commonwealth. These providers serve more than 75,000 older Pennsylvanians. LeadingAge PA provides education, advocacy, and work force growth support to its members.

The next Quarterly Meeting will be on July 12, 2023, at Masonic Village in Elizabethtown at 10:00am. The speaker will be an expert on Medicare plans and the pros and cons of those plans. This information will be just in time for the Medicare Open Enrollment period in the fall.

What should be blooming in April? What with these warm days early or late in the week, and freezing nights in between. I'm looking with admiration at the daffodils that stand tall through it all. Notice the display in front of the Bistro entrance. The trees are unfurling their buds in shades of red and chartreuse.

This is an anxious time for bluebird enthusiasts. Beth Shank had bluebirds guarding her nesting box until she found them gone and something less than wonderful was there on top proclaiming ownership. I checked with Joyce Kieffer who last year was the happy grandma to her bluebird brood. No luck so far this year. They referred me to Barb Bankard. She reported that her bluebirds have almost completed their nest in her box. If the eggs get laid, there are still predators that will destroy the eggs. But there is always a next time.



IF you have had your garden mulched, and IF you have bearded iris, spring into action. You may have planted your iris correctly with the rhizomes at ground level or just below the surface. A layer of mulch might now make the rhizomes buried, and the iris will not bloom. So on the next warm day, plan to push the mulch away from your beloved iris. Some iris growers are fanatics about their treasures. I knew a woman who grew prize-winning specimens. If they didn't produce

properly, she would have a firm discussion with them, and tell them they had one more chance before out they would go. I thought she may have had something with being firm.

I had a shrub, a mock orange, that had not bloomed for three years. I had had it. We had a talk. It bloomed the next year. You might want to try that with a troublesome plant or maybe you should move it, so it receives the proper amount of sun or shade or whatever. Perhaps that is the challenge and fun of gardening: figuring it out.

As we take our Garden Walks with the longer days, we should look at what is flourishing in our neighbors' yards and check out the Community Gardens on the East Campus. It's a good way to get ideas of what you might want to try because their plants are thriving Ask questions.

You know spring is in the air when you see Todd from the maintenance department tilling the Bethany garden on March 22. He has to work hard to avoid the perennials that are along the fence in some of the plots - like Lois Heagy's raspberry bushes and Miriam Wood's strawberries, not to mention Charlotte Perrago's perennial flower beds. Some gardeners like Scott Kehs have already planted spring onions. And soon there will be so much more.

We gardeners owe a great deal to those residents that came before us and worked diligently to provide us with such a beautiful area. Long ago in 1977, when all of us were still young adults, Bethany residents started the garden club on land at the Children's home. Looking over old notes, it looks like the club had already started the produce tables on the East side (there was no "west side" of Bethany at that point). Some of the members baked cookies to donate to the table. There are reports of bluebirds laying eggs in the nest boxes and just like now problems with weeds and animals getting into the garden. Some things just never change, do they?



But there was a change coming for the Garden Club. They had an idea to move the garden to its current location. In February of 2002, plans moved forward and after months and months of work, the new garden was "open for business" around the spring of 2004—in an area about half the size of the current garden. In a report of September 2005, the late John Creighton (Nadine's husband) stated due to the addition of new apartments, there was a need to enlarge the garden area. Thanks to the leadership of John and the hard work from many people 15-20 years ago including Charlotte Perrago and Earl Norman and others, our garden has doubled in size, continued to flourish, and sits ready now for the current 30 members anxiously waiting to get dirty in the soil.

Lots of good produce and flowers to come! Be on the lookout for the produce tables on both the East and West campus later this spring.

THURSDAY, APRIL 20, 2023 - 7 p.m.

Our lecturer for the second lecture will be Erica Shaffer. Her topic will be the "Health Of the Environment". She will talk about trees and how to keep them healthy, the use and nonuse of chemicals in the garden/lawn/landscape, planting for wildlife, and how our health is directly benefited by these types of choices.

She is a Garden Speaker and Writer, Herbalist, former Nursery Manager of Highland Gardens for 30 years, a "Tree Hugger" and "Petal Pusher".

For 30 years, Erica Shaffer was Highland Gardens, that small-but-homey neighborhood garden center along South 18th St. in Lower Allen Twp. She was the face and voice of the business who answered bug and fertilizer questions, yakked about plants with loyal customers who were more like botanical brethren, and spoke to every garden club in the area. She's the one who drew up those unique, hand-written plant signs that were sometimes blunt and sometimes funny but always filled with hands-on advice that only down-and-dirty gardeners come to know. And when it was time to order plants for the

garden center, Erica was like a kid in charge of the candy store, filling every corner of Highland's five acres with cutting-edge and delicious selections that box-store staff never even heard of.



This year the Garden Trains located in Martha's Garden between The Oaks and MapleWood starts running on May 10, weather permitting. Scheduled runs are every Wednesday and Saturday from 10:30 to 11:30am until the end of September. If you have never seen them, or it's been a while since you saw them, treat yourself to a show and come on over to Martha's Garden and see all the enhancements. Treat yourself to some childhood memories, or fantasize about what life was like in those times.

Check out the Firehouse and fire engines as the trains go rolling by.





Come and watch as the "Main Line" Pennsylvania Railroad freight train, the "Short Line" passenger train,

and the "Trolley" travel through the pastoral rural area in the background, and then the industrial area including worker housing and a brewery.

From there, the trains travel through the southwest America village portraying multiple centuries in the old southwest. See the pony express station in the background, and the Little White School House with the schoolmarm watching the kids playing on the playground. As you leave the southwest village and travel into the 19th century don't miss the saloon and then the more modern buildings of the next era. We travel further through time to the 20th century community including a theater, a Harley Davidson dealer, a traditional diner, plus a sawmill modeled after one in Gaithersburg, Maryland.

The "Main Line" train is a freight operation. Some days it pulls standard freight cars, other days it pulls a circus train complete with circus animals and characters. The "Short Line" train is a passenger train that runs a route similar to the main line but on a shorter stretch of track. The antique "Trolley" shuttles back and forth between the passenger station at one end and its barn at the other end of its track. All this activity is viewable from The Oaks porch, or the Arbor on the other side of the layout.

If you have any interest in joining us in being a blessing to the residents of Bethany Village, we can use all kinds of skills to build, operate, and host the operations of our trains.

Bored of the Flies?

The adult spotted lantern fly, with its bright red wings and black spots, looks like the Marvel Universe version of a ladybug. Bethany Village residents saw a lot of them last summer. What do we know about them? What can we expect this summer and for the foreseeable future? And what, if anything, can we do about them?

Two BV residents, Raymond and Margaret Pepe, will suggest answers to these questions during a presentation on April 13 at the Rife Center (2:00pm). The Pepes are



Penn State Extension Master Gardeners. Penn State Extension is dedicated to delivering science-based information to people, businesses and communities.

This briefing will address a wide range of questions. What do lantern flies look like at different stages of their life cycle? Are the bugs likely to kill plants and trees? What species are most vulnerable? What control measures are feasible? Do fly traps work? (Spoiler alert: sticky bands around tree trunks are likely to do more harm than good. The Pepes can explain why.)

The Pepes' presentation, to be followed by a Q&A period, is sponsored by the BV Ecology Team. The Master Gardener program, offered through universities in the United States and Canada, provides intensive horticultural training to volunteers who contribute to their communities by providing research-based information about home horticulture and pest management to the public through plant clinics, educational programs, demonstration gardens and other projects.
