Call to order: The meeting was called to order at 9:30 am by President Dale Meadowcroft

Moment of Silence: A moment of silence was observed in memory of departed friends and neighbors and our many blessings.

Administrative Report: Brian Grundusky:

- Covid – After a hiatus, one associate tested positive and is doing well.
- Finance – In April, we missed our OR target by .2%. This was driven by health insurance issues (BV self-insures) and maintenance (HVAC repairs). Occupancy was a robust 96.4% (budgeted percentage is 95.2%) and brought revenue up by \$80,000.
- Projects are underway with summer weather. The Rife Kitchen expansion is on target for a July completion and electronic lock installation is complete in W. Apartments, with the East underway.
- BV Games – Went well with even MapleWood residents participating.

A question concerning the new dining construction, and it, too, is on target for a fall completion.

It was observed that we have a significant amount in Checking and Money Market Funds with Peoples Bank. Jim will be looking into investing a portion of that money to get a better rate of return. 9. Dining (C) - Dale Meadowcroft, Chair:

Highlights of the May 14 meeting with Dustin Goss follow.

- We are fully staffed in management with the addition of a manager of healthcare in April. Our biggest need is in the kitchen for three experienced cooks and two sous' chefs. These positions make up over 200 hours of staff work that must be picked up every week by existing staff. We are still looking for a bartender.
- Improvements that have been made or are in the process of being made are the community wide buffet held the second Thursday of the month. Tuesday evening specials in the Collegiate Café were favorably complimented upon.
- Comments from committee members included praise for the variation in the menus and the quality and temperature of the food. Consistent service from the Bistro was discussed and Dustin commented on several alternatives including an update to the point-of-sale system which could include kiosk order entry and potential ordering by cell phone at the

table using QR codes. They are even researching the use of robots for service as we move into the future.

- Committee members were asked to reinforce with their friends to bring meal quality problems to the immediate attention of the waitstaff so that the situation can be corrected positively and immediately. Discussion included reaching out to residents who have not entered the dining facility recently so they can experience the positive changes.

25. Wood Shop (A) - Joe Kearney, Co-Chair:

We are all saddened by the unexpected death of Ken Kieffer, the Shop Chairman when it came to maintenance and purchasing. Ken led 4 workshops for newcomers. He was a valued leader of our shop and will be greatly missed. His family asked that in lieu of flowers, etc., donations be made to the Woodshop of Bethany Village.

A few lamp repairs for residents brought in \$25. Beth Shank made another bluebird house and is in the process of making another bat house. Beth's first bat house has been placed on the side of the farmhouse facing the dog park, where it is easy to spot. Beth also made a wooden cross at the request of a resident to be placed on the grave of a loved one.

An antique cushioned rocking chair/glider still sits in the shop after two weeks. Seems no one wants to take up the challenge of repairing it. We will have to contact the owner with regrets. The shop has been given the go-ahead to install a door between the shop where the machines are and the adjacent room where our wood is stored, and finishing occurs. Members who have stored wood there are being asked to remove it unless they plan to use it in a reasonable amount of time. The purpose of doing this is to make better use of the square footage we have. Machines will be rearranged or, if never used, discarded. Cabinets will be combined and better arranged. A general house cleaning will be undertaken.

And so, once again a reminder that the shop is open every Tuesday from 10 am to noon. Visitors are welcome to stop in just to give us a look-see or to bring items in for repair. Come one, come all!

Old Business: Dale Meadowcroft:

- Following up on work that is done around our BV campus by volunteers, Dale noted the deadheading of flowers and the singing now done in The Oaks, among other helpful activities. He mentioned the help that a simple greeting or handshake could be to another.

- Kristen Juchem:

She has made a list of where volunteer help is needed in The Oaks, MapleWood and Residential Living, with brief descriptions of the activity and asked to be contacted with new needs and ideas. This list is attached to the Minutes.

New Resident Socials will be held twice a year and will include residents who have moved in within the last year. Transportation, its cost, and the limitations of drivers, will be slowed until August, when we will resume, along with programming.

Re: Music Therapy –There will be moving about of three pianos. When completed, they will be tuned.

The Longest Day, an Alzheimer's fundraiser and a first for BV, is still open for registration. A 60th year celebration of BV is upcoming and in the planning stages.

Next week is Appreciation Week, with walking tacos in Martha's Garden, and each shift arranged to be served. Special treats will be offered daily. Volunteers are welcome to help distribute the treats. Dale stated that the Associates would really like to be recognized by the residents with a pat on the back, etc.

Trivia is growing in popularity. Kristen is looking at ways of rearranging the Bistro for participants and also at how other facilities do Trivia.

New Business: Dale Meadowcroft:

- Dale will be attending the Residents' Council Meeting at the Bethany Towers today to share what we have in common.
- Pet Policy- Ray Saunders spoke of the BV Pet Policy, an 8-page agreement establishing guidelines and boundaries for all pets residing in the residential areas. The policy is effective for both current, newly acquired, and visiting pets. Noting that some residents may have forgotten details, he highlighted several.

#11. Dogs and cats must be on leashes of no more than eight (8) feet outdoors and four (4) feet indoors. This is due to safety reasons.

#12. When dogs or cats are moved through the building, they must be moved from the resident's apartment to the nearest outside exit avoiding all public areas.

#13. Pets shall not be brought into public lobbies, dining areas (inside or outside) or other public gathering spaces, with an exception for visiting therapy dogs.

#15. Any pet which bites, attacks, or displays any type of aggressive behavior will not be permitted to live at Bethany Village.

Other:

- Claire Powers shared a safety issue on West that may also be an issue on East. Pedestrians leaving the West RL apartment building and heading to the Wesley/Wilson light have to cross two roadways that are not marked as a crosswalk. Signs indicating a

crossing might also slow drivers down. It was mentioned that crossing from the West cottages to the lower part of the Springfield's parking lot on Sheeley also had no signage.

- Joan Bretz has sent an e-mail to Mark Ruiz bringing to his attention the need to update emergency evacuation maps.

A few lamp repairs for residents brought in \$25. Beth Shank made another bluebird house and is in the process of making another bat house. Beth's first bat house has been placed on the side of the farmhouse facing the dog park, where it is easy to spot. Beth also made a wooden cross at the request of a resident to be placed on the grave of a loved one.

An antique cushioned rocking chair/glider still sits in the shop after two weeks. Seems no one wants to take up the challenge of repairing it. We will have to contact the owner with regrets. The shop has been given the go-ahead to install a door between the shop where the machines are and the adjacent room where our wood is stored, and finishing occurs. Members who have stored wood there are being asked to remove it unless they plan to use it in a reasonable amount of time. The purpose of doing this is to make better use of the square footage we have. Machines will be rearranged or, if never used, discarded. Cabinets will be combined and better arranged. A general house cleaning will be undertaken.

New Business: Dale Meadowcroft:

- Dale will be attending the Residents' Council Meeting at the Bethany Towers today to share what we have in common.
- Pet Policy- Ray Saunders spoke of the BV Pet Policy, an 8-page agreement establishing guidelines and boundaries for all pets residing in the residential areas. The policy is effective for both current, newly acquired, and visiting pets. Noting that some residents may have forgotten details, he highlighted several.

#11. Dogs and cats must be on leashes of no more than eight (8) feet outdoors and four (4) feet indoors. This is due to safety reasons.

#12. When dogs or cats are moved through the building, they must be moved from the resident's apartment to the nearest outside exit avoiding all public areas.

#13. Pets shall not be brought into public lobbies, dining areas (inside or outside) or other public gathering spaces, with an exception for visiting therapy dogs.

#15. Any pet which bites, attacks, or displays any type of aggressive behavior will not be permitted to live at Bethany Village.

Other:

- Claire Powers shared a safety issue on West that may also be an issue on East. Pedestrians leaving the West RL apartment building and heading to the Wesley/Wilson light have to cross two roadways that are not marked as a crosswalk. Signs indicating a

crossing might also slow drivers down. It was mentioned that crossing from the West cottages to the lower part of the Springfield's parking lot on Sheeley also had no signage.

- Joan Bretz has sent an e-mail to Mark Ruiz bringing to his attention the need to update emergency evacuation maps.
