Call to order: The meeting was called to order at 9:30 am by President Dale Meadowcroft

Moment of Silence: A moment of silence was observed for "a peaceful transfer of power."

Administrative Report: Brian Grundusky:

Highlights of Brian's report:

- Covid Currently 2 cases (not associates) with minor symptoms. With the change of season, the trend has been for numbers to increase.
- 2025 Budget. Will be discussed at Thursday's November Coffee with Brian. He is pleased with resident feed-back.
- Community Update, November 13, with Todd Andrews, who will be looking at industry trends and the Residents' Satisfaction Survey.
- Dining update. We are working with new vendor, Aramark, whose start date at Bethany will be 1/20/25, with Sodexo services until then. They will set up a Dining Showcase on 12/5, from 9am 1pm, and residents are encouraged to drop in at any point during that period. Survey material will be distributed then. Brian is negotiating to retain some managers who are currently with Sodexo. Approximately 90% of associates, other than

- managers, are Bethany staff and will be staying on. There will be a new dining executive manager, who will be under Aramark.
- On-site pharmacy, the Medicine Shop is undergoing reorganization and will remain at Bethany. The owner has requested moving the shop from upstairs to the current West Reading Room. Brian's thought is to have a smaller reading room where the temporary Brain Health Room is located. There are also a number of ideas for repurposing the upstairs hallway leading from the Clinic to the current pharmacy location. Brian brought this proposal to the council for consideration, discussion, and feedback at a future meeting. No immediate time frame for this.
- Bank update. Brian has been in discussion with PSECU. They may be interested in coming to BV and having an on-site satellite office. There will be weekly bus trips to Orrstown Bank for the immediate future. Brian is also working with PSECU to have an ATM placed at the community.
- Recent fatal choking incident in Springfield's. If residents or associates need support to deal with this sad incident, let Brian know and he will arrange for it.

Questions for Brian.

- Partnership with Golden Years Club, an intergenerational program, at Cumberland Valley High School. See committee report #23, Volunteer Support, for more information on this endeavor.
- E-Billing portal, an optional program aimed at residents who would like to look at their information in detail. Notify Brian if there are any "odd" things going on. This will not replace checks/paper billing. More details at Community Update.
- Phase 3. A request was made for a comparison of square footage between the existing area and the proposed rooms. During the community update, Brian will talk in more detail about where the money for capital projects comes from. There was a request for better publicity when small group information is presented.
- Relationship between Interim and Bethany. Interim is a third-party company BV partners with. They provide home care services within BV. As there were questions about Interim's services, Brian will request that they come and talk at a future Coffee.

<u>Minutes from October 1, 2024</u>. A correction has been made to the Minutes, (page 6, under Nominations/Elections Committee), which now read Charley Sproule, current Assistant Treasurer, is going off the Council at the end of the year.

<u>Financial Report</u>: Jim Smeltzer, Treasurer:

Jim stated that we have "good numbers," with approximately \$93,000 in Peoples' checking and \$55,000 in Peoples' Money Market. These accounts will automatically be rolled over to Orrstown Bank (which acquired Peoples'). We are waiting for notice of a new bank to come to BV and will then make a decision on how to best invest the money. The October Fund Raising analysis (amounts earned by various groups) will need a few corrections, though the total is accurate. See attached reports for details.

Reports by Committees (C), Activities (A) and Clubs (CL)

1.Art(C) - Marcia Marsh, Chair:

The East Art Committee successfully participated in the recent RC Fair, and we sold a record number of pictures. We have also received several donations of paintings.

The West Art Committee successfully changed/replaced approximately 15 pieces of art this month. We also received several donations from residents for future use.

2. Audio-Visual (C) – Bob Brommer, Chair:

This is my first report to council since the renovations were started on the AV systems in the Rife Center and the Chapel. There has been no official notification to me of the work completed and the remainder of work to be completed.

Through my own observation, it looks like the Rife Center installation is completed and the Chapel is yet to get started. I am looking forward to the completion of the Chapel installation and getting trained on the new systems. I have been spending some time getting to know the equipment, but that only shows to me how much I need some formal training. I will keep the council updated as we make our way through the next phases of this project.

<u>3. Audit</u> (C) – Dennis Plymette, Chair: No report. 4 volunteers are needed for the committee, preferably from the RC.

4. Benevolence Fund (C) - Ginny Wilt and Kay Hess, Co-Chairs:

The Vesper committee has scheduled a meeting in early November to approve the dollar amount being disbursed to the 10 charities supported through this fund. During this meeting monthly counters will be confirmed for 2025.

11. Facilities (C) – Carol Pennington, Chair:

Highlights of 10/29 Facilities Committee report from Mark Ruiz and other items, questions and comments follow:

Mark Ruiz

- Staffing levels: Maintenance, -2; Housekeeping, -2; Laundry, -1: Transportation, -5.
- AV Project is progressing. The auditorium is done, but the fiber optic cables are not yet installed, so we do not have broadcasting.
- AL Painting and Carpeting projects are almost finished.
- SNF desk is finished.
- Court Canopy is delayed because the township wants it to include a sprinkler system.
- Landscaping: Plants for Martha's Garden have been purchased. Many leaves and much leaf-blowing. Tree trimming has started on East side.
- Solar charging station will start on 1/20/25.
- West storm basin was discussed at a township meeting, where the design was explained.
- West Apartments: elevator frames and lobby touchup will be done in parts.
- There are quotes for motion-activated switches in the Multipurpose room.
- West Apartment filters started 10/30. East Cottage filters are 90% complete.
- Sink hole work on east will start 11/6.

Questions and Concerns:

- West Apartments –There are complaints that there are too many leaves and some trees are dying.
- East Cottages: sweet gum trees are troublesome.
- West Apartments: Cameras at Doors 51 and 55: Mark is purchasing more cameras. New sheer curtains are needed for balcony doors.

18. PARCR (C) -Lowell Starling, Chair:

Organizational change for the BV PARCR Committee:

I called a meeting of all BV residents who are PARCR members or interested in PARCR to discuss two topics. The first was to discuss the committee's goals and we worked through a list of possible goals. The next step was giving out homework for committee members to identify the top three so we can focus our efforts. The second was to look at the list of potential future topics gleaned from survey responses after the October meeting and vote on the top three, which will be communicated to the PARCR December board meeting.

For example, Joe Kearney made 10 new cellphone/tablet stands and 4 bowls. Joe also made 3 mosaic top serving trays, which he sold at the Fall Fair. Beth Shank continued with her fruit holding bird feeders and blue bird houses. Ken Hatcher sold one of his clocks. This one was a clock mounted on a cutting board.

Ken discovered, with the help of a resident, that seats could be installed on the numerous walkers we see around campus. The seats allow a person using their walker to sit down and take a breath. So, Ken is making a couple of those. Ken also improved the jewelry stands used at our fairs by adding "stops" at the end of the display stands to prevent the gems from falling off the ends of the stands.

Along with these projects go the usual repairs on items for residents. Beth refinished a chair seat and tabletop. Ken built two ballot boxes for our restaurants and repaired a table leg, while Ed Ravizza repaired and refinished a bar stool with a swivel seat. Leroy Weaver repaired a cutting board. These repairs and sold items brought in \$170, with more to come. Of this amount, the shop kept \$100 for its petty cash and gave the remainder to the Residents' Council. It should also be mentioned, that when requested by Barb Bankard, Ed Ravizza made a shadow box to display a gown worn by Barb's granddaughter on her first birthday. The girl lived with her family in Korea at the time and an elaborate gown was the tradition.
