Call to order: The meeting was called to order at 9:28 am by Vice-President Bob Regan, who will preside today in the absence of President Dale Meadowcroft.

Moment of Silence: A moment of silence was observed.

Administrative Report: Brian Grundusky:

Highlights of Brian's report:

- Financial update: February numbers are not yet in, but we didn't meet our goals in January due to occupancy levels in all 3 areas. As an example, Brian stated that 15 residents died in The Oaks earlier in the year and, at one point, we had 9 vacancies there. Though numbers are up now campus-wide, this is lost revenue which we will have to make up during the year.
- Aramark – “Great feedback” from residents about food service, though there have been a few issues in Assisted Living.
- Sprinkler and heating work continues at the West Apartments. Work is about complete in skilled. After the deductible, these costs will be borne by insurance. We are looking at different types of sprinkler systems for the future.
- Recent small kitchen fire in an East Center Apartment – one resident was temporarily relocated until repairs are complete, and the fire was contained to the one apartment. Quick response from staff and local fire department limited the event to 3 hours.
- Phase 3 – Anticipated start date is June 1. Work has begun with subcommittees around storage.

- Asbury Ascend will be starting again. This conference is for Asbury leaders across the system. The Rife Center will be used for 2 days in April for this event. Brian wanted to make the group aware that more people would be around campus during that conference.

Questions and Comments –

- Regarding recent low temperatures in Springfield’s dining room – Still tweaking this issue. The addition of baseboard vents and fans is being investigated. It was pointed out that the current fan is very noisy and interferes with dining enjoyment.
- PSECU - The ATM is up and running. Are deposits accepted? – yes. Is there a \$1.50 service fee? – yes, for all non PSECU members. Are deposits to other banks accepted? – yes if your bank permits this.

Following the meeting Brian contacted PSECU and received the following information. The reference to the sign being removed refers to signage indicating the ATM was fully functional.

Hi Brian,

I did not know the sign was removed, however, as of today, the issues have been resolved, and the ATM is good to take deposits. I do apologize for how long that took but the ATM should now be fully functional.

Other financial institution customers can use the ATM to make deposits as long as their financial institution allows it. There is no surcharge for making deposits.

Also, yes, that is correct. PSECU charges a surcharge fee on withdrawals that are done out of network. PSECU members and customers who are part of shared networks such as AllPoint, Co-Op, & CU\$ will not be surcharged at the ATM.

The treasurer’s report for January - February 2025, Trial Balance (this report reflects what is going on with the banks we deal with), and Profit and Loss, statements are attached. Our net profit for the year is \$3776.07, the majority of which was raised by sales from the furniture room. More complete details are included in the statements. There was a request that our checking account of nearly \$60K and earning virtually no interest at Orrstown Bank and the Money Market, also at Orrstown and approximately \$55K, be moved to our new bank, Members1st. Jim stated that he is working on this.

9. Dining (C) - Dale Meadowcroft, Chair:

Very pleased with the improvement in quality and presentation of meals for Independent Living dining. Attendance at Springfield's is up (after the issue with temperatures was addressed), the every-other week Sunday buffet is well-attended. Please utilize Springfield's and/or John and Annie's Bistro. We think you will be greatly impressed.

10. Executive Committee (SC) - Dale Meadowcroft, President, and Chair: No report.

11. Facilities (C) – Carol Pennington, Chair:

Highlights of the Facilities Committee meeting February 25, 2025, with Mark Ruiz.

- Staffing levels: Maintenance: -2; Housekeeping: -3; Laundry: -2; Transportation: -3.
- AV Project is complete. The audio volume is a Comcast problem.
- Center Apartment carpet delivery will be made in March.
- The Court Canopy construction is underway.
- Solar Charging Station project and visual instructions are completed.
- Door access is now complete. Badges have been made available to all cottage residents.
- HVAC filter changes have been done for all areas. (Some questions on this from RC meeting).
- West Apartments: The motion-activated switches in the multi-purpose room are installed.
- West Apt. elevator frames and touch-up painting – in process. Door 30 is done. AL will be the last area done.
- Rife Center mikes: not on the outside table yet.
- Waste Management is the new trash company. New trash cans have been delivered to all cottages. Glass **will be** recycled.
- Dryer Vent Cleaning: The vendor will do East Cottages first.
- Springfield's Dining Room heat – working on it.
- Insulation: Wagman is now adding it at no charge. (It seems they were never told to add additional insulation).
- West Campus Repairs: The delay in replacing the drywall in ceilings was caused by waiting for insurance company approval.

Questions and Comments –

- East Cottages: The driveway to the garden is full of ruts. This repair will be in the 2026 budget.
- East Building: The Bistro is very dusty. Mark reported that a new company will be taking over renovation cleaning.
- West Apartments: Some West Apartment residents say that their HVAC filters were never changed. There is a stairwell E-1 access door problem.
- Are all associates trained in CPR? No, all associates do receive fire extinguisher training.
- New chair lifts for the stairs have been brought in, in case of fire. Two new defibrillators have been ordered.

- The garage door will be repaired when all the parts arrive.

Following the reading of the report, a lively discussion ensued. The ongoing problems in the West Apartment Building brought up comments about a lack of supervision over on-going projects for at least 5 years, the size of our campus, the need for more funds and the need to get these issues in the minutes. We need to make sure there is sufficient oversight in the work done during Phase 3.

Presiding Chair and Vice-President, Bob Regan, offered to talk to President Dale Meadowcroft about putting together a small group to meet with Brian Grundusky and Mark Ruiz to address issues of concern. A motion was made by Tom Usiadek to put together a small working group to meet and work with Brian and Mark to address facilities-related problems. The motion was seconded by Carol Pennington and passed unanimously.

12. Garden Club (CL) - Cindy Lindsay, Chair:

The Garden Club held their annual planning meeting for the coming season on February 20 and discussed their successes and areas for improvement. Donations from Bethany residents for the produce that the club offers on tables on both East and West were notably decreased last summer, however donations did total \$606. From this amount, the club voted to donate \$200 to Bethany Village Care Assurance and \$200 to the Central PA Food Bank. The rest of the money will be used for garden club needs. There are several available garden plots open to residents and staff. A full plot is approximately 20 feet by 20 feet. Half plots are approximately 10 feet by 20 feet. A group of residents can share a plot also. If anyone is interested, please contact Cindy Lindsay.

Dawn welcomed residents to the meeting and shared the following:

Resident Right/House Rule

- Resident Right #18: A resident and resident’s designed person, and other individuals upon the resident’s written approval shall have the right to access, review and request corrections to the resident’s record.
- House Rule #4: VISITING HOURS: Residents are free to receive visitors at any time. Residents have the right to terminate any visit. No person shall enter a resident’s room without first identifying him/herself and receiving the resident's permission to enter.

Safety and Security

Brain Railing, Supervisor of Safety and Security was present to share with residents Fire Alarm procedures.

- **When the Fire Alarm goes off, MapleWood Residents that can do so should open their apartment door, move to the hallway, and wait for further instruction by responding staff.**
- It is the responsibility of the staff to listen to the overhead announcement and assist MapleWood Residents to a safe area based on the location of the alarm.
 - Rest assured if you are not able to do so, staff and/or first responders will check every apartment in the affected area and assist you as needed.
- Our Fire Safe areas are constructed with protection for up to 90 minutes and we would follow the guidance and instructions from the Fire Department if we would need to move further.

- Although we are in Lower Allen Township and they are our primary responding department, in the event of a real emergency we would be assisted by several departments from the surrounding areas.
- In MapleWood, it is a state requirement for us to conduct fire drills once a month during different times of the day including sleeping hours.
